Bio

I first really got to know Gina when she was in her mid-teens and a lifeguard at Plumbers and Pipefitters Local 562 Complex in North Saint Louis County, MO. Even though our families were friends we had an age gap between us.

My father owned a bar and restaurant in the "Village of Riverview Gardens" where Gina's father Willie tended bar. Numerous trades people and politicians frequented my father's establishment and that was how our families' friendship got started as I remember it.

I remember Willie telling me that his daughter Gina was an applicant to be the first woman in Insulators LU 1 which Business Manager Larry Walsh made happen. Larry definitely had an eye for talent.

Gina became an Insulator Mechanic after serving her four year apprenticeship. Gina had the skills to work both commercial and industrial which made her very easy to employ. I remember telling my colleagues that I wish we had fifty Gina Walshes when I was the BA/BM before going to the International. The contractors loved her!!

From there Gina started her political career as a Trustee for the Village of Riverview Gardens Fire Board and things took off after that: Missouri State Representative, Missouri State

Why Gina Was Nominated

Empathy: I was always taught that fifty one
percent of leadership is empathy. Gina has
always shown that from the time that she got
in the Local till this current day. You do not rise
up through the ranks the way Gina did if you
do not have empathy.

Right to Work: If it wasn't for Gina efforts
Missouri would be a right to work state today.
Gina worked tirelessly on the floor and behind
the scenes of the Missouri State Senate to
defeat this union busting legislation. She also
helped coordinate the local unions to get the
message out and the people to vote against
this law.

During this whole time in the Missouri
Congress, Gina sacrificed salary and benefits
that she would have been making as a
journeyman insulator and never complained.
