Katy became an Elevator Constructor with an already amazing set of skills under her belt. It started with her interest in music; playing drums, guitar, and banjo with a family band. She talked about her family, "A giant circus, 6 kids, all different interests and personalities. We grew up poor on a farm in NE Ohio, so we all know how to work and be grateful."

After high school, she got scholarships to study audio engineering and did audio for live shows and venues for about five years. "I learned a lot about electronics and electricity. I can sense a bad wheel bearing just from the differences in frequencies." "There was not a lot of stability in it," she said, "Either you are working lots of hours, or you have dry spells."

With all the traveling required, and all the times she had car issues, she decided to become an automotive technician. She worked in various automotive shops for 5 years, before becoming an elevator constructor.

Recognizing she had transferable skills and wanting to secure a career in a union trade, she applied to the IUEC and IBEW apprenticeship programs. The IBEW called first, so she worked as an inside wireman apprentice for 6 months before getting into the IUEC apprenticeship. "My mom is thrilled I



have a union job, it gives her peace of mind that I will be alright."
