She got her start in union construction in 2012 as a Local 17 Sheet Metal Worker upon graduating from the Building Pathways Pre-apprenticeship Program.

Throughout her career, Shamaiah has been a sub-foreman leading crews to complete specific parts of a building project and has helped to advance the mission of diversity, equity, and inclusion in construction by starting Cannistraro Women United, an affinity group within that company.

Currently, Shamaiah is the Chair of the SMART International Women's Committee, a trustee on the SMART Recruitment and Retention Council, and the Business Development Representative for the North East Regional Council of SMART.
