Upon her release in 2008, Latauna joined the Washington Area Women in the Trades (WAWIT) program and was introduced to the Sheet Metal Workers Local 100. She quickly excelled, completing her apprenticeship and building a career in the trade.

With over 16 years in the industry, Latauna has taken on leadership roles within her local and SMART International. She serves as an organizer, shop steward, and RISE Committee member, working to support and uplift her fellow members. Latauna is also a dedicated community leader, coaching youth sports and mentoring young people. She is passionate about creating an inclusive workplace and uses her story to inspire others to overcome challenges.
